Rav Aharon Lichtenstein zz//I

in the spring of 2015. Rav Lichtenstein's powerful advocacy of *Torah u-Madda*—expressed often in his overwhelming output of *Torah she-bikhtav* and *Torah she-be-al peh*—charted a path for its adherents and had an incalculable impact on Yeshivat Har Etzion, on Yeshiva University, and on Orthodoxy worldwide.

Rav Lichtenstein will be remembered as a beacon of both halakhah and maḥashavah; a Sinai and an oker harim; a gadol of extraordinary vision and an equally extraordinary grasp of subtle and intricate details; and a giant in both intellect and character. There is virtually no topic in Jewish life that he did not address, and nothing in his shiurim, writings, and conduct from which we cannot learn. More than one thousand works of his have appeared in print, either from his own pen or from those of students adapting his shiurim and siḥot; and we have as well, especially now, many a ma'aseh rav, a wealth of awe-inspiring anecdotes.

May the life and work, the aspirations and achievements, of this singular leader continue to guide us through complex and often unprecedented challenges, and enlighten the generations to come.
